Our Art curriculum links closely to our PSHCE, History, Geography or other subjects in the curriculum. Where links to our values can also be made they are.



Together we will succeed

Our Art curriculum runs on a 2 year odd / even cycle. Linked to our school values. Knowledge organisers act as the progressive journey through each topic which is linked to our chronological long term plan. They are inked to our school values as closely as we are able to.

Our children learn through declarative knowledge in art to know factual information about techniques, styles, artists, and art history. It involves knowing what things are.

- Example: "Picasso was a famous Cubist artist."
- Example: "Watercolour is a painting technique using water-based paints."

Our children use procedural knowledge in art to know about the skills and processes used to create art, such as drawing, painting, and using different materials.

- Example: "Mixing primary colours to create secondary colours."
- Example: "Using a brush to apply paint to a canvas."



Children and subject leaders can then assess each lessons learning outcome against knowledge organisers to monitor how secure learning outcomes are.
